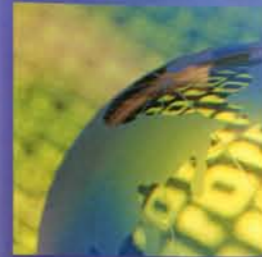

Elite Education - World-class Academic Excellence in Science, Technology, Medicine & Management



About Imperial College London

Throughout 2007, Imperial College London celebrates 100 years of living science to mark the Centenary of the signing of its founding charter on 8 July 1907.

Imperial College was established through the merger of the Royal College of Science, the City and Guilds College and the Royal School of Mines in South Kensington, the heartland of Prince Albert's nineteenth century scientific and cultural vision. Prince Albert's son, King Edward VII, laid Imperial's foundation stone two years later in 1909.

Originally focused on teaching and research in science and engineering, 1988 saw the introduction of a new discipline, medicine, to the College following a merger with St Mary's Hospital Medical School at Paddington. Further mergers came with the National Heart and Lung Institute in 1995, the Royal Postgraduate and Charing Cross and Westminster Medical Schools in 1997, and most recently the Kennedy Institute of Rheumatology in 2000, led to the formation of the Faculty of Medicine in 1997.

Since its formation, Imperial has grown to become a globally renowned centre of excellence in science, technology, medicine and management. This reputation was underlined in 2006 when the College was rated the world's ninth best university in *The Times Higher Education Supplement World University Rankings*.

Imperial College has a long history of working closely and collaborating with external organisations, including industry, government organisations and other universities both in the UK and around the world, on global issues that affect society. The College's mission statement includes a clear focus on the practical relevance of its research:

"Imperial College embodies and delivers world-class scholarship, education and research in science, engineering and medicine, with particular regard to their application in industry, commerce and healthcare. We foster interdisciplinary working internally and collaborate widely externally."

This statement remains true to Imperial's founding objective whereby "...the highest specialised instruction should be given and where the fullest equipment for the most advanced training and research should be provided, in various branches of science, especially in its application to industry..."

With 62 Fellows of the Royal Society of Great Britain among the current academic staff and distinguished past and present members of the College including 14 Nobel Laureates and two Fields Medallists, Imperial's contribution to the the global scientific community over its first century has been immense.

During this time, inventions and innovations include the discovery and development of penicillin by Sir Alexander Fleming and the invention of holography by Professor Dennis Gabor which has found many applications in science, art and industry since the 1960s. Other notable research includes Professor Geoffrey Wilkinson's work on organometallic sandwich compounds which led the way for the development of catalytic converters, and Professor Eric Laithwaite's pioneering development of linear motor which led directly to the technology behind the world's fastest train, Shanghai's maglev.

This commitment to the application of research for the benefit of society continues today with current focuses including interdisciplinary collaborations to tackle issues such as climate change, through the recently established Grantham Institute for Climate Change. Elsewhere, mathematical modelling is being used to predict and control the spread of infectious diseases such as AIDS, malaria, schistosomiasis, TB and other emerging pandemics, with researchers working in areas around the world where these diseases cause widespread misery.

Having begun in 1907 with around 600 students and just 12 professors, today, Imperial is home to almost 12,000 students, having doubled in size over the past 10 years. The College is proud of its strong international

culture-historically, it has always had a sizeable overseas student population and today this represents 39 per cent of the total from more than 120 countries worldwide.

Almost 100 years on, the College's underlying aim is to improve lives through the innovation of our staff and students has not changed and the vision of our foundation still continues to be a strong motivator for our research and teaching, as its strategic intent demonstrates:

- To remain amongst the top tier of scientific engineering and medical research and teaching institutions in the world.
- To develop our range of academic activities to meet the changing needs of society, industry and healthcare.
- To continue to attract and develop the most able students and staff worldwide.
- To establish our Business School as one of the leading such institutions in the world.
- To communicate widely the significance of science in general, and the purpose and ultimate benefits of our activities in particular.

During its first century Imperial people and their ideas have made a significant impact on the world through their outstanding achievements in science, engineering and medicine. The College is determined in its efforts to enable Imperial staff, students and alumni to continue making this difference in the 100 years that follow.

History of ICAAHK

The Imperial College Alumni Association Hong Kong (the "ICAHK" or "the Association") was formed in 1982 through the encouragement of Lord Flowers, the Rector. It was strongly supported by Sir Eric Ash and Lord Oxburgh, as well as by the present Rector, Sir Richard Sykes, who will continue this tradition.

The first Chairman of the Association was Dr. S L Chen, followed by Mr. Peter Y S Pun, Mr. D J Newman, Dr. H K Cheng, Dr. Harry Lee and Prof. Paul Cheung who was elected in 2006-2007.

The Association is a registered society in Hong Kong. Currently, the Association has a total membership of over 500.

- The objectives of the Association are to:
- Promote fellowship amongst past students of Imperial College
 - Provide support for the past students of the College living in Hong Kong
 - Keep our Hong Kong Alumni up-to-date with the latest developments in their fields
 - Establish links between Imperial College and Hong Kong
 - Promote the importance of science and technology to Hong Kong and the world

An elected Committee comprising of a Chairman, Vice Chairman, Honourary Secretary, Honourary Treasurer and four Committee Members runs the Association on



a voluntary basis. The Committee holds office from one Annual General Meeting to the next, and organises and convenes events that fulfill the stated objectives.

Each year, a Freshers' Reception is held for students who are about to leave Hong Kong to start an academic course at the College. A regular dinner/talk event is held by the Association to welcome the visiting lecturers and to make/renew contacts.

In addition, the Association arranges talks on technical, business and management topics, and technical visits to construction sites as well as to other operating facilities. The Association also organises social events such as country walks, boat trips, friendly golf competitions and dinners. These events are open to alumni who live abroad but are visiting Hong Kong - helping to establish relationships amongst overseas alumni.

Making a Connection with the Future

International connections for an international city

Sitting in the Dynasty Club - one of his favourite places to connect with old friends - Mr. Peter Pun relates his memories of his hometown, Shanghai.

"I left in 1953," he recalls. "Shanghai was open to the world before 1949, so there were American, and European style buildings constructed during the Roaring 20s and 30s, it was very international. When I went back in 1983, it was so dilapidated. Thankfully, since the 90s, things have changed."

Throughout his 40-year career in

managing international large-scale engineering projects, Mr. Pun has always understood the importance of internationalisation - which is something he believes is a unique benefit of studying at Imperial College.

"The most famous people in engineering sciences either go to America or the United Kingdom. So the professors at Imperial College are all world famous scholars. That's why the best people in this field went to Imperial College."

Indeed, Imperial College has produced some of the world's top engineers, and among them is Mr. Pun, a renowned civil engineer and founder of PYPUN Engineering Consultants Limited.

As Chairman and Chief Executive of the company, Mr. Pun has been involved in numerous major engineering works in Hong Kong, including major highways, airports, infrastructure developments, architectural and building works, as well as feasibility studies for sewage master plans, to name a few. These projects have contributed substantially to the development of Hong Kong's infrastructure as one of the world's best.

In fact, Mr. Pun has always believed in building for international success. He had a



key role in the founding of City University of Hong Kong in the 80s. As one of the Executive Committee Members, he devoted substantial time and played a critical role in the planning and establishment of the campus development. In this project Mr. Pun took the opportunity to draw on the fine academic and engineering traditions of Imperial College in the planning of the new City University by inviting Lord Flowers, who was the Rector of Imperial College at the time, to be one of the five member panel responsible for selecting the winner of the architectural and planning competition for the campus.

It's his strong leadership and international exposure that has earned him a Justice of Peace (J.P.) in 1980 and the distinction of Officer of the Order of the British Empire (O.B.E.) in 1995. But despite these accolades, Mr. Pun continues to keep an eye towards the future.

In 1982 at the request of Lord Flowers Mr. Pun helped found the local Imperial College Alumni Association in Hong Kong. It's little wonder that Mr. Pun is also a firm supporter of

the Endowment Fund. "We do it because we are proud of Hong Kong's achievements."

"We should contribute for the future of the college and for society," adds Mr. Pun. "By contributing, we help society. And most importantly, we help others contribute to society as well."

In Mr. Pun's eyes, the international connections that students at Imperial College build with each other are one of the most rewarding aspects of studying overseas.

"Imperial College attracts many of the world's top students," says Mr. Pun. "Hong Kong students will benefit by having this opportunity to work closely with bright minds."

The benefits go beyond the university years. Imperial College Alumni are leaders in their fields - which creates a network that will benefit students. "There are lots of graduates from China now," Mr. Pun cites as an example. "This creates lots of opportunities for graduates to meet other alumni. This will help Hong Kong to stay ahead on the international level."

Therefore, supporting Hong Kong's students to study abroad will definitely further strengthen Hong Kong's position as a world-class city. This makes every contribution to the Endowment Fund a contribution to Hong Kong's future.

For Love of Country

How Dr. H.K. Cheng believes the Fund will help Hong Kong

A simple glance at Dr. H.K. Cheng's office reveals his lifelong philosophy: Never stop learning, and use your knowledge to help your country.

His shelves are filled with the latest books on subjects ranging from structural engineering, to history, to the economy. And piled high in front of his desk are issues of *The Economist*.

Since graduating from Imperial College in 1964, Dr. Cheng has become one of Hong Kong's most prominent figures in structural engineering. He is no

stranger to accolades either, being honoured with a GBS in 1998 and an OBE in 1990. His professional achievements have also earned him Gold Medals from the UK's Institution of Structural Engineers in 2002 and from the HKIE in 2005.

Despite worldwide acclaim for his work, which includes the Sun Hung Kai Centre and the Hong Kong Academy for Performing Arts, Dr. Cheng still possesses an intense love of learning. It's this love that he attributes to his success.

"When I worked for the government, I told my boss I wished to continue my studies abroad," recalls Dr. Cheng. "My boss refused. Then in 1962, he said, 'You must apply as soon as possible because I will retire soon. So I will recommend you.'"

Despite his boss' recommendations, Dr. Cheng still had to overcome financial difficulties to study at Imperial College. Dr. Cheng's story highlights the importance of the Endowment Fund. "Talented people should be put in the best of universities," states Dr Cheng. "Imperial College is the top engineering school in the world. I wish there had been such a fund in my time."

Fortunately for Hong Kong, Dr. Cheng managed to win scholarships and graduate with distinction. In the early 1960s, there was a sea change in concrete engineering technology, and the UK had stepped up very quickly.



Dr. Cheng used the knowledge he gained at Imperial College change Hong Kong's engineering landscape, as is evident in his work on the Sun Hung Kai Centre - which was at one time Hong Kong's the tallest building.

In Dr. Cheng's eyes, the ability to shape society for the better is the most rewarding part of learning. "My personal view is that whoever receives such kind of assistance should always come back to Hong Kong and help Hong Kong. The Hong Kong alumni have set up this fund.

So they should come back and give back to the society."

Indeed, Dr. Cheng lives and breathes his own philosophy-becoming one of the driving forces that have made Hong Kong a world hub for structural engineering technology.

In fact, Dr. Cheng himself has been recognised worldwide. "In 1995, Imperial College offered me a Fellowship," beams Dr. Cheng. "That is the highest honour the college can offer an alumnus. I was greatly honoured."

At that, Dr. Cheng proceeded to talk about the newest digital photography equipment with our cameraman - his eyes lighting up at the prospect of keeping up-to-date with the latest technologies.

"Never stop learning," offers Dr. Cheng as final words of advice. "And always bring your knowledge back. Use your knowledge for Hong Kong and for your country. That is the whole idea."

A Tradition of Looking Forward

Dr. Harry Lee speaks about the importance of change, the values of traditions and the role of the Endowment Fund

Dr. Harry Lee is no stranger to change. In fact, he is a believer in evolving with the times. Over the years, he has played a key role in turning the TAL Group from a textile and garment manufacturer to a complete end-to-end solutions provider for some of the world's largest fashion brands. (The TAL Group reportedly manufactures one out of every 7 dress shirts in the US.)

While Dr. Lee believes that change often happens for the better, he's also a firm believer in upholding those traditions that serve to ensure a brighter future. One such tradition is the Endowment Fund.

"Imperial College is still one of the top schools," says Dr. Lee with pride. "I was reading about the projects they are doing. I was very impressed. They change with the times but they've always upheld their tradition of top education. And the

Endowment Fund helps create a tradition for wanting to go to Imperial."

Despite his illustrious success in business, Dr. Lee is most proud of being able to help young students. "The Fund gives underprivileged students a chance to go to Imperial College and get a top education. They should then come back to contribute to Hong Kong society."

However, Dr. Lee believes the Endowment Fund goes well beyond helping underprivileged students to fund their education. In his view, the Endowment Fund is more important now than ever for every Imperial College student - rich or poor. A portion

of the Endowment Fund goes to enhancing the College's library and other facilities. Keeping up with technology has become increasingly crucial in today's world of globalisation and instant communications.

"Students today have a tougher time than we did," points out Dr. Lee. "The way we did business 20 or 30 years ago was much easier. Now, you have to be a lot more sophisticated. So today's kids are under a lot more pressure. Every bit can help."

His own evolution mirrors his philosophy of evolution and tradition. His evolution from electrical engineering graduate to preeminent business leader is a case study on how to thrive in an ever-changing society, while his steadfast commitment to the community is a timeless virtue.

Despite his forward-thinking views and pioneering spirit - two traits that have helped him ensure TAL Group's place among international giants - Dr. Lee still smiles fondly when he takes a stroll down memory lane.



"When I was studying, I felt stressed," he smiles. "We took exams all the time. We didn't even have television. We listened to wired radio, and we had to walk down to the store to borrow a phone. But looking back, it was probably the freest time I've ever had."

Staying Competitive

How the Endowment Fund gives Hong Kong an edge

As Executive Director of Hong Kong Trade Development Council, Mr. Frederick Lam is intricately involved with the city's development. Since 1986, Mr. Lam has played key roles in maintaining Hong Kong's competitiveness on the world stage.

Over the decades, Hong Kongers have seen their city undergo tremendous change – from a manufacturing superpower to a regional operations and research & development hub. Therefore, Mr. Lam stresses the importance of ensuring Hong Kong's future talent.

"Hong Kong is still a very viable manufacturing centre," says Mr. Lam. "Although the factories are no longer in Hong Kong, it doesn't mean the industry is not. Hong Kong has the potential to become the R&D and technology trading centre for this region because of our world-class IP Protection regime."

In this respect, Mr. Lam is a staunch advocate of giving Hong Kong's brightest students the opportunity to bring back the

latest knowledge from around the world. "I hope it will enable more capable students to study at Imperial College," says Mr. Lam. "It's important for Hong Kong students to have access to the best universities in the world if Hong Kong wants to maintain its position as an international city."

One does not have to look far to see the benefits of the Endowment Fund. According to Mr. Lam, Hong Kong is already in need of a world-class talent pool in order to grab opportunities across the border.

"I know that the industry is beginning to feel the need to recruit more scientists and engineers for both their Hong Kong and Mainland operations. It's vitally important for us to maintain close links

with world-class science and technology institutions such as Imperial College."

Many countries around the world are already shifting their thought leadership to keep in step with globalisation. And Imperial College is widely recognised as a global thought leader. This is reflected in the cultural mix of its student body.

To enforce this vision, initiative such as the ICAAHK Endowment Fund will contribute to keep Hong Kong ahead of other economies. "Overseas students make up quite a big portion of Imperial College," recounts Mr. Lam. "Imperial College attracts a lot of students from around the world."



Ultimately, how much of a competitive edge Hong Kong will have in the world is intimately related to how much of an edge its people give to its students. The Endowment Fund provides exactly this edge.

Mr. Lam therefore, advocates Hong Kong's leaders to support the next generation (and indeed Hong Kong's future) by supporting their education.

On a personal note, Mr. Lam leaves Hong Kong's youths with these words of wisdom: "Imperial College is competitive. It's not easy to get in, and it's also not easy to get out with good grades. So be prepared to work hard."
